During October, the graduate assistants and PDS student representatives (reps) prepared their research proposals for the National Association of Professional Development Schools (NAPDS) conference in March 2023 in Jacksonville, Florida. The students have an eclectic mix of research topics that will likely attract many attendees to their presentations. Thank you to all the faculty members who spent time mentoring these students.

The international program associated with PDS was officially named the Michael and Nancy Chicola International Professional Development Schools Consortium in October. Recruitment was back on for the popular program this fall after a pandemic pause. Teacher candidates from across the Buffalo State Teacher Education Unit will once again be traveling on short-term, faculty-led, study away trips in 2023. 2023 NAPDS Conference Research Presentation:

This oversimplification has many ramifications, especially for students with intersex conditions. Thus, it is important for science educators to learn and emphasize the true complexity of biological sex. Chloe's presentation will address this issue, possible solutions, and opportunities for partnerships between schools and universities.

FAMILY FUN NIGHT AT THE BUFFALO STATE CHILD CARE CENTER

On November 2nd, the Buffalo State's Child Care Center collaborated with Professors Kathy Doody and Patty George to host a Family Fun Event for the Center's students and families that was supported by a PDS Mini-grant.

Children and families were invited to rotate through pet-themed stations that presented activities and materials that span the relevant domains within early childhood (literacy, academics, speech/language, social-emotional, and physical) all within the common theme of pets. Families participated in the featured activity and often left the station with a finished product (a dog collar, a book about pets, etc.) Some stations required physical activity, such as navigating an obstacle course with their "pet" (stuffed animal), similar to the agility courses featured at the Westminster Dog Show. Students in EDU 513 – Theory, Research and Practice of Literacy Instruction, EXE 612 – Managing the behavior of young children with disabilities EXE 652 – Interventions for young children with disabilities, staffed all aspects of the event with the help of Future Teachers Club volunteers.

The evening opened with a welcome from Dean Paterson (and her puppet sidekick, Baby Monkey) and an overview of the important connections throughout time between animals and humans from Dr. Krista Vince-Garland.

Additionally, dogs from <u>Paws for Love</u>, an animal therapy visitation program sponsored by the Erie County SPCA, were on hand to visit with the children and families. This arrangement allowed children who are comfortable with the animals to seek their comradery and allow children who are less comfortable to admire them from a safe distance.

There were more than 50 children in attendance, almost 70 parents/family members, about 35 student volunteers, administration, several Board members, and SOE faculty, for a total of over 180 people.

PDS partnership at Holmes Elementary School



Our unique PDS partnership at Holmes Elementary School provides EXE majors seeking dual certification in childhood education & childhood special education, a 9-hour block of coursework, that promotes the acquisition of literacy practices needed to support diverse learners. "Working together to provide evidencebased best practices in literacy instruction to ensure the growth of all learners into literate, knowledgeable, and humane human beings" is the shared vision that guides our Holmes Elementary PDS liaison team. This co-created vision statement reflected our belief that students' access to knowledge and rigorous education is an equity issue (Braetz, 2022) that we are both passionately

and collaboratively committed to. Two important elements that contribute to the success of this partnership are: 1) an intentional blending of best practices to create an aligned and authentic classroom-based learning experience and, 2) a commitment to broadening and deepening Holmes students' knowledge of the world beyond their lived experiences.

Dr. Jan Richardson's book, "The Next Step Forward in Guided Reading (2016)," is a key resource used by both Ken-Ton elementary teachers and our Buffalo State Candidates. Preservice teachers and veteran teachers sit side by side and study, implement, and reflect on shared literacy practices. These practices are the basis for small-group guided reading lessons,

large-group literacy lessons, assessments, and interventions. The benefits of having an aligned curricular focus and a similar belief in targeted and differentiated literacy practices have resulted in mutually beneficial growth opportunities for our mentees, mentors, professors, and most importantly Ken-Ton students

Our liaison team also recognized that for our Holmes students to become truly successful, we needed to do more than ensure that they acquired important reading skills. We needed to immerse them in content-rich material, deliberately exposing them to sophisticated vocabulary and

ideas. In conceptualizing a project that would embody this vision, we leveraged local resources at Buffalo State College as well as the specialized expertise of science and classroom teachers to create a PDS project that was not only locally relevant and engaging but also academically rigorous. Teacher candidates taught whole-group literacy lessons aligned with the New York State ELA (2017) and Science Learning Standards (2016) - specifically focusing on Earth and Space Sciences. They then organized and led a field trip to Whitworth Planetarium where students learned about the solar system and participated in an engineering lab where they created their own "space transporter", applying engineering and modeling principles. This incredibly motivating experience grew directly from our liaison team's shared vision.. Holmes elementary students not only grew their knowledge base as they applied meaningful comprehension strategies, but they also had their first encounter with a college campus, which planted seeds for their future ambitions and dreams.

IPDS COSTA RICA

Since 2012, the Buffalo State School of Education has provided opportunities for teacher candidates to teach and study on five continents through the (newly renamed) Michael and Nancy Chicola International Professional Development Schools (IPDS) Consortium. As IPDS has grown, so have efforts to collaborate with faculty and engage students from across grade levels and academic disciplines. New and current IPDS programs are consistently developing, all focused on the goal of helping individuals at any stage of their education trajectory to globalize their understanding and experience of education and to foster individual relationships with school and community partners across the globe.

IPDS is pleased to announce that program leaders Tamara Horstman-Riphahn of the School of Education Office of

the Dean, Pamela Schuetze of Psychology, and Angela Patti of Exceptional Education are developing a new opportunity for Buffalo State students to experience Costa Rica.

This past November, Horstman-Riphahn and Schuetze traveled to the capital city of San José and the small town of Uvita in order to organize program details and fortify relationships with school and community partners. This new program will include Spanish language immersion courses and homestays provided by Personalized Spanish, service-learning at a preschool center, field experiences at Escuela Flor de Bahia including bilingual teaching and learning and classroom instruction, cultural activities and encounters with Costa Rican food and traditions, and ecological explorations of the flora and fauna throughout the country and surrounding the famed "Whale Tail" on the southern coast.

The inaugural IPDS Costa Rica program is tentatively scheduled to be a spring 2024 course with 2-3 weeks travel in Costa Rica during May/June 2024. This program is particularly well-suited for PK-8 teacher candidates, science educators, and students whose program or interest center on child development. PDS CONFERENCE 2022

This year's PDS conference, held on Friday, September 30th, was attended by over 100 PDS partners, including school administrators, classroom teachers, Buffalo State faculty, teacher candidates, and alumni, who convened to share the fruits of their ongoing research and discuss a variety of topics related to education and PDS partnerships.

The morning was highlighted by a visit from Buffalo's first Poet Laureate, Jillian Hanesworth. Jillian discussed her experiences in education – from growing up on the East Side, a community disenfranchised by decades of racist city policies, to her struggles as one of few Black college students at SUNY Fredonia. Importantly, she emphasized how her love for reading and the attention of a few, dedicated educators not only supported her through her educational struggles (including a surprising dyslexia diagnosis during her time at Fredonia) but also ignited her passion for poetry. Jillian performed a handful of her poems, including the haunting "Little Black Boy" written in response to the 2014 murder of Michae



written in response to the 2014 murder of Michael Brown. Children's books were collected to support Lillian's oppoint library box pro



collected to support Jillian's ongoing library box project, Buffalo Books, that has brought over 40 library boxes to the East Side. Jillian will be holding a hybrid in-person and virtual writing workshop for teachers entitled 'Teachers are Writers' through Just Buffalo Writing Center on Thursday, December 15th.

Presentations and discussions related to PDS partnerships, ongoing research, and a variety of topics relevant to educators filled the afternoon. As the sessions wound down, attendees reconvened to hear from the New York State Teacher of the Year, Carly Santangelo. Carly has been a classroom teacher for 10 years and currently works as a middle and high school agriculture teacher at Cuba-Rushford. Carly spoke about her efforts to bring authentic

learning experiences to her students, including her adventures in raising chickens and writing grants to enrich her teaching through field trips and guest speakers. Santangelo also emphasized the importance of building community both in and outside of school, describing her journey of supporting a student as they pursued their personal goal of earning a drone pilot's license.
