



Buffalo State PDS Partners with the Center for Teaching and Learning in Edgecomb, Maine

We are excited to announce the new PDS partnership with the Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL) in Edgecomb, Maine. This program is a unique and academically rich opportunity for Buffalo State teacher candidates to study reading and writing workshop theory and pedagogy. The CTL is a one-of-a-kind K-8 school based on the work of Buffalo State alum, Nancie Atwell. Nancie's instructional methods, which focused on workshop models of teaching and learning, transformed literacy instruction in schools. The school she founded implements these approaches across all content areas and grade levels.

Professors James Cercone and Kristen Pastore-Capuana led a team of English education and elementary education undergrad and graduate students to CTL in January 2023 to engage in this internship program where they observed classrooms at CTL, collaborated with CTL teachers and students, and learned from school administrators and curricular leaders about the

cutting-edge crosscurricular literacy practices and portfolio assessment at CTL. Carolyn Freeman, Bailey Buckley, Max Wagner, Zachary Ogren, Jarrett Whipple, and Emilee Misener also engaged in analysis of student writing and participated in conferencing with CTL students. Prior to the internship, participants read Nancie Atwell's seminal work, In the Middle, and participated in workshops exploring the theoretical foundations of workshop practices.



The Buffalo State teachers and teacher candidates are excited to implement what they learned at CTL in local classrooms. The next PDS Maine internship is in the works for the 2023-2024 academic year. International Literary Society:

A Focus on Literacy Skills and Social and Emotional Learning at the 5th Grade Level

Social and emotional skills can have a profound impact on academic skill development. Effective facilitation of social and emotional learning (SEL) often involves integrating SEL skill development within academic curriculum. We connected two PDS partner schools to create an international literary society - a cross-cultural exchange to support the development of literacy and SEL across two cohorts of 5th grade students. The two schools involved in this project were Tapestry Charter School in Buffalo, and the School of Nations in Brasilia, Brazil. The cross-cultural exchange of ideas and sharing of perspectives was central to our project, and this cross-pollination was facilitated through various opportunities including engagement with Padlet and via the Anne Frank Project's Virtual Lab.

To support literacy skill development, students in both groups read and explored the book "My name is Jason. Mine too.", and created poetry and artwork the reflected themselves and their learning experience. Through art and poetry, the mixed-media book "My name is Jason. Mine too." tells a story about friendship and social support between two people that had many commonalities, as well as individual differences. In some ways, the story is mirrored in our



literary society. The students from Buffalo and Brasilia had opportunity to learn from each other. They had opportunities to develop literary skills, and social-cognitive and emotional skills including theory of mind, social awareness, empathy, and an improved "global perspective".

On May 1, 2023, Jason Reynolds (the author of the book we used for our international literary society), a #1 New York Times bestselling author, will be visiting and speaking on campus as part of the Bulger Lectureship Series. Students from the international literary society will be in attendance (in person, and virtually from Brazil) and they are excited to see and meet the person who created the book that got them so hooked on reading poetry and thinking about how environment and culture can influence an individual.

Professional Development Schools: Responding To Student Needs Post Covid

At the start of every semester, Professional Development Liaison Teams (made up of Buffalo State Faculty and local school district faculty and staff) collaborate to determine what practices they will design and implement to positively influence the growth of teacher candidates and the P-12 students they serve. This year Liaison Teams were presented with a clear and pressing need: to address the huge declines in student performance due to the past three years of interrupted schooling. The challenges faced were daunting and too numerous for any one entity to shoulder alone. This unfortunate situation provided the perfect opportunity for Buffalo State and schools throughout Western New York to join together and help students rebound after the pandemic.

One creative example of how a PDS school responded to this challenge, was developed by The Liaison Team at Cleveland Hill Elementary School. Collaboratively, they tackled the question "What support beyond the classroom can we put in place to address the widening gap that exists for students who lack critical reading skills?". Their solution was to develop a before-school tutoring program called "Rise and Read!". This morning tutoring program is held on the same two days that Buffalo State teacher candidates are completing their Literacy Practicum at Clevehill. The schedule allows candidates to tutor before attending their class. Interested Buffalo State teacher candidates applied, interviewed, and were hired as literacy tutors. The candidates provide targeted instruction to small groups of Clevehill students, under the guidance of Clevehill's Literacy Instructional Coach. The goal of this tutoring program is to help students close the achievement gap by acquiring the essential skills needed to successfully access/meet grade level standards in ELA.

This innovative collaboration is a win-win for everyone! Clevehill Elementary students have gained an extra two hours a week to learn essential literacy skills - helping to close the gap in their performance. Buffalo State teacher candidates are delivering meaningful reading interventions to elementary students and watching them grow; while also earning a few extra dollars. This authentic experience has contributed to the candidate's professional knowledge and has increased their confidence. Candidates are thrilled to have been hired as a tutor while having the opportunity to benefit from the clinical support provided by Buffalo State's faculty and the district reading staff.

Workshops with Dr. Nanci Monaco

Dr. Nanci Monaco has been an Associate Professor in the Department of Elementary Education, Literacy, and Educational Leadership since 2000. She is a licensed New York State Psychologist (child) and recently completed a sabbatical year studying the effects of COVID on children and families. She has developed several one-hour workshops which she has been offering at schools and community agencies. collaboration. There is no cost associated with the workshops.

Some examples are:

1) Children and increasing anxiety: Causes, actions teachers and parents can take to reduce stress, children's insight into their anxiety, misdiagnoses of anxiety disorders, etc.

2) The aftermath of the pandemic: Social emotional and cognitive changes that linger after the pandemic and what teachers and parents might do to aid in a return to less stressful times

3) Children and gun violence: How to make active school shooter drills less anxiety provoking, how to discuss this topic in developmentally appropriate ways, how to help children identify and report problematic or violent behaviors in classmates, and studies of thwarted school shootings

4) School bullying and DASA: What has worked and what still needs to be addressed 10 years later.

5) The Yale Happiness Study: and other research on promoting happiness. Lessons for teachers and parents.
