

## BUFFALO STATE UNIVERSITY AND CENTER FOR TEACHING AND LEARNING SCHOOL UNIVERSITY—PARTNERSHIP





Drs. Jim Cercone and Kristen Pastore-Capuana from Buffalo State's English Education Department started a new partnership with the Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL) in Edgecomb, Maine. The CTL provides instruction to students in grades K-8 using a workshop model developed by Nancie Atwell who is an alumna of Buffalo State. The profits

from Nancie Atwell's book In the Middle were used to start the CTL in 1990.

The CTL offers an intern program for veteran teachers. Drs. Cercone and Pastore-Capuana met with the CTL's head of school, Katy Inman, regularly to develop an intern program for teacher candidates. They traveled to the school with students from the Buffalo State Teacher Education Unit (TEU) in January 2023.

In their inaugural visit, the January group had the opportunity to closely observe classes and move freely about the active classrooms to gain insight into every facet of the workshop process. Drawing from their observations, they were given the chance to discuss questions they developed with the CTL teachers, and had the opportunity to read through student portfolio work. Outside of the classroom, the students and professors engaged in critical conversations about what they learned and how they could see it applying to their own teaching contexts.



In October, another group from Buffalo State visited the CTL.

Emma Grimm, Sydney Mueller, Claire Miller, Danielle Myers, Eve Doherty, and Keli Garas-York participated in the intern program at the CTL during the week of October 23, 2023. The group observed in the 5/6 and 7/8 classes for reading and writing workshops. Afterwards the group was able to debrief with the teachers. Also, the group gained a great deal of information about how the school functions and learned firsthand how the school maintains a safe space and caring environment.

Observing this environment was beneficial in knowing how to encourage students to take more risks in things like their writing and to build self-confidence. The five students from the group (all Buffalo State English Education teacher candidates) completed mini projects on the various aspects of the workshop model. The group from Buffalo State left the CTL with lots of materials and ideas and were invigorated by the experience.

#### IPDS: TEACH AND STUDY ABROAD

The Buffalo State School of Education's International Professional Development Schools (IPDS) consortium was officially named the Michael and Nancy Chicola IPDS Consortium at a ceremony in October 2022. The new name honors Nancy Chicola, '66, associate professor emerita of elementary education and reading, and her late husband, Michael, who made a generous commitment to support the IPDS mission. We are grateful for the support provided by the Chicola family and all our donors, which opens the door to these incredible opportunities for many students who do not envision study abroad as possibility.



In recent years schools have experienced significant cultural and linguistic changes in their classrooms that reflect national demographic changes. IPDS utilizes existing PDS structures to more effectively prepare new teachers for this changing educational context. Through the international contacts of our education faculty, IPDS participants are placed

in international schools and community centers where they engage in immersive teaching and learning initiatives, build personal and professional relationships with colleagues from different backgrounds, and develop the knowledge, skills, and experiences necessary for effective, globally-minded practice. These partnerships provide distinctive opportunities for individuals working with children and youth opportunities to globalize their understanding and experience of education and of language learners.



#### IPDS: TEACH AND STUDY ABROAD

After a two-year break due to the pandemic shut-down, the IPDS came back strong in 2023 with 45 students participating in short-term, faculty-led programs to the Dominican Republic, Italy, Germany, Rwanda, and Zambia. In addition, three WNY teachers participated in the IPDS Colombia Experience Educators Exchange during the February school break and three teacher candidates completed their practicums through the international student teaching program in Siena, Italy. In spring 2024 IPDS launches new programs in Costa Rica and Spain.

#### **BUFFALO BOOK BUDDIES**

The 2022 PDS Conference at Buffalo State University sparked an idea for a unique project at Hillview Elementary School in the Lancaster Central School District. While attending last year's conference, Amy Moeller (principal), Jen Bandelian (second-grade teacher), Katie Perritano (second-grade teacher), and Joy Carroll (third-grade teacher) were all inspired by keynote speaker, Poet Laureate Jillian Hanesworth. Hanesworth spoke passionately about her initiative, known as "Buffalo Books". Buffalo Books aims to promote literacy and increase access to books by placing more Little Free Libraries on the East Side of Buffalo.

Jillian's speech was a call to action for the Hillview team. During a brainstorming session at the conference, they decided to donate their 2022-23 PDS mini grant funds to Buffalo Books. Hillview purchased over 300 children's books featuring characters from diverse backgrounds. Junior participants in Patty George's EDU 311 course (The Teaching of Reading and Other Language Arts in the Elementary School) helped select titles.



#### **BUFFALO BOOK BUDDIES**

Hillview Elementary's students played the most important role of all in this project. After reading the books purchased for the Little Free Libraries, they wrote book reviews. Hillview's teachers recorded the children reading these reviews. QR codes were generated for the book review videos and placed inside the books. This enabled children and families visiting the libraries to watch the videos and select books that interested them.

Hillview raised an additional \$716.00 through its annual talent show and donated the funds to Buffalo Books. When the project was completed in May of 2023, the books were delivered and distributed to libraries on the East Side.

In a recent update from Jillian Hanesworth, Buffalo State and Hillview learned that many of the books were placed in a library box at the Johnnie B. Wiley Amateur Sports Pavilion and in various boxes on Northland Avenue. Additionally, the books were placed in library boxes at special events such as a recent expo showcasing Black writers from Buffalo (see photo).

This project was a memorable experience for everyone involved. It brought together a school, a university, and the community- all to promote literacy. While this project had many impactful components, one aspect really stood out. The children at Hillview Elementary will never forget the opportunity provided to share their love of reading with "Buffalo Book Buddies".
