Title: The Use of Sign Language in Teacher Preparation Programs in Lusaka, Zambia and

Buffalo, USA

Title: Centering Reflection in Professional Growth: Preparing Profession-Ready Teachers through PDS Partnerships

Reflective ability refers to teachers' ability to notice important teaching moments, to use their knowledge of evidence-based teaching approaches to analyze instructional decisions, and to apply insights from this process in their future teaching. Stakeholders in a PDS partnership will showcase the ways in which they have integrated reflection activities as a tool for professional growth throughout a block of undergraduate literacy courses. The presenters will highlight how video-based reflection has impacted teacher candidates' knowledge and pedagogy through the scaffolded and explicit modeling of effective reflection practices and how it informs faculty and supervisor perspectives in PDS settings.

Presenters: Tamara Horstman-Riphahn, Brandon Kawa & Bailey Buckley **Title:** Evaluating the Transformative Influence of a Teach-and-Study Away Program on Alumni: Cultivating Skillful, Empathetic and Broad-Minded Educators and Citizens Through a Globalized Exchange of Thoughts and Ideas

This research examines the transformative impact of SUNY Buffalo State University's School of Education's International Professional Development Schools (IPDS) consortium. The study assesses the lasting influence of this faculty-led teach and study away experience on participants, exploring personal, professional, and pedagogical changes. Using mixed methods, we analyze pre- and post-travel reflections and evaluations, along with an alumni survey. Preliminary findings suggest alumni experience personal growth, increased cultural sensitivity, and enhanced teaching practices. This research highlights the value of international professional development in shaping educators' lives, fostering a global perspective, and better preparing them for diverse student populations.

Title: Improving schools with research, not convenience

This project researched how school systems run based on studies regarding schedules, timing, and duration. It may be shared with parents and elected officials to respond to the current and changing school schedules to benefit all those involved in education.

Presenters: Jennifer Reichenberg, Gina Dudkowski & Michelle Gallagher **Title:** A Mentor Academy Supports Teacher Professional Growth Throughout the Career Span

Presenters will describe a Mentor Academy that was a collaboration between the university and the PDS. The purpose of the Academy was to create mentor facilitators to support schoolwide expert mentoring of methods teacher candidates, student teachers, first year teachers, teachers new to the school, and teachers new to a grade level or other teaching situation. The Mentor Academy met monthly and was facilitated by a university faculty member and teacher liaison at the school with support from the school administration. Key features of the Academy, scaffolds for implementation, and mentor facilitators' perceptions will be highlighted.

Title: Promoting A Deeper Understanding of Arithmetical Calculations and Critical Thinking Skills in the Lower Elementary Mathematics Education

This is an examination of highly engaging activities that promote critical thinking in early elementary mathematics classrooms. My research further investigates how playful activities get students to be engaged in mathematical problem solving. I believe that the use of tools such as measuring tapes allows students to further develop their mathematical understandings in a hands-on fashion and provide a tangible context to transfer concrete concepts into their abstract counterparts.




FINDING THE JOY IN MATH

The Elementary Education, Literacy, and Educational Leadership Department has been working to support our teacher candidates to find joy in teaching and learning mathematics, especially in the upper grades.

Professors Liza Bair and Alayla Ende incorporated special experiences in their Elementary Math Methods courses so that teacher candidates had the opportunity to participate in a Math Lesson Study in an upper grade classroom at Cheektowaga Middle School with Jennifer Lewis, a New York State Master Teacher. Surveys given to teacher candidates found that most of our majors were not interested in teaching 5th or 6th grade math, even though they will be certified to do so. Participating in the Lesson Study increased students' comfort level with teaching upper level math.

We are also working to boost confidence for the math certification exams. Tammy Giancola, an instructor from the math department, has offered powerful free workshops each semester where candidates work in small groups to gain confidence and practice items for the Content Specialty Test. Workshops are announced each semester by email and on flyers in Bacon Hall. Those who complete the course delight in feeling more prepared for this challenging exam.



These collaborations with our school partners and colleagues across campus help us advance the joy of math!

In Western New York, the recent total solar eclipse captivated the city as the moon passed between the sun and Earth, casting its shadow over the region. For one local elementary school, the excitement began on Thursday, March 14 at STEM Night.

Mrs. Maskell's EDU 316 teacher candidates dedicated their time to plan, organize, and facilitate hands-on learning experiences related to the eclipse with their PDS partner, Heritage Heights Elementary School, in the Sweet Home Central School District.

Upon arrival, each student received a bag with stickers, eclipse glasses, and a passport that showed them the different activities and locations that was "stamped" with a star sticker as they made their way around the building:
